

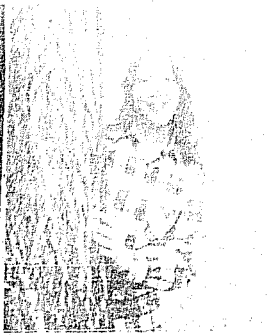

GOVERNMENT GOULASH

An important aspect of Poplar's Community Development Block Grant is the selection of an architect for the renovation of the Gateway Hotel. Proposals from architects from Helena, Bozeman and Glasgow will be received this week. On Monday, June 26 at 10:30 A.M. at City Hall, there will be an important meeting. At this meeting, members of the public will have the opportunity to select the architect for this project based upon the proposals submitted. I would like to see young and old, whites and Indians, poor and rich at this meeting in order that they have input on this important decision.

Indian Health Service representatives have given me an oral commitment on the extent of their possible participation in a "rapid-rail" type of garbage system for the Poplar community. The cost of this new system is being compared to potential garbage receipts for future years in an effort to ascertain whether this system is feasible for Poplar. Every effort will be made to bring this system to this community because it is felt that garbage expenditures can be reduced and because it is also felt that garbage

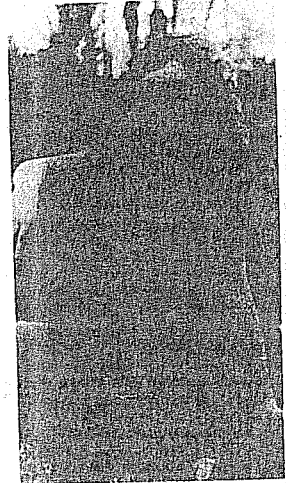
litter in the community can be reduced. Should you desire to listen to the discussion on it, come to the next City Commission meeting on Tuesday, June 26 at 7 P.M.

At the last City Commission meeting, there was considerable discussion on the condition of most of this city's streets. It was agreed that most of the city streets need an overlay in order to ensure their future. The cracks and the potholes have allowed moisture to get under the asphalt which also speeded up the deterioration of the city's streets. It is time now for the people to seriously look at their streets, and make a decision on whether they want to overlay the streets or not. The need for overlaying the streets is there; do you want to make this decision now or not?

Kimberly Ann Nees, 17, a three-year National Honor Society Member at Poplar High School, received the American Legion scholarship and was named the outstanding business student, upon graduating in the top ten percent of the Class of 1979. She was found dead in the Poplar River on Saturday, June 16, a homicide victim. Born on August 2, 1951 in Cody, Wyoming, she is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ted Nees, her sister, Pamela and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Nees and Mr. and Mrs. Howard Smith, all of Poplar. Services were held Tuesday in the First Presbyterian Church of Poplar with burial in the Poplar City Cemetery.

The tragedy surrounding Kim's untimely passing has touched our hearts. But, we must not let this cloud our judgement. Kim's final gift to us is the most costly of lessons. We are indeed fortunate to have been blessed with the presence of this individual even if for only a short time. I know that in our hearts and in our minds we will always be much richer for having shared this life with Kim.

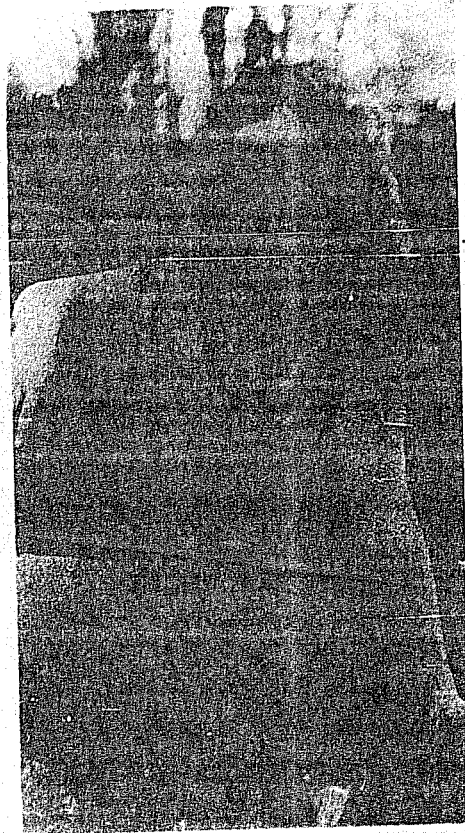

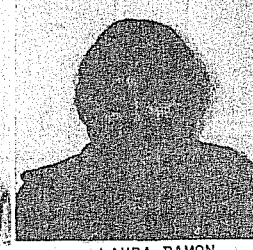

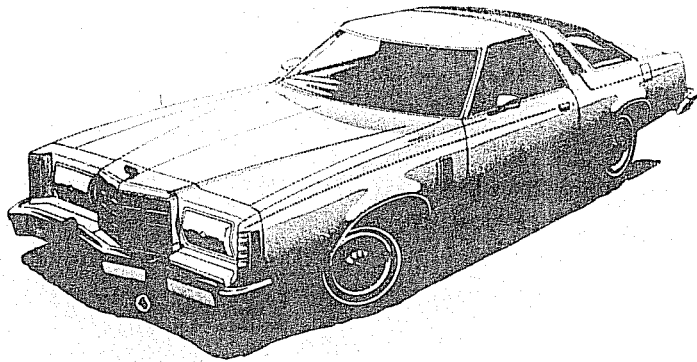

MONTANA HISTORICAL SOCIETY
The National Historic Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC) has awarded a \$38,438 grant to the archives department of the Montana Historical Society for the conservation and care of the enormous Haynes Photographic Collection.
"This is the largest grant the Society has ever received," State Archivist Brian Cockhill commented, "and it could not have come at a better time." The need for the grant came with the donation of 20,000 glass plate negatives, slides, and prints generated by F. Jay Haynes (1853-1921) and his son, Jack Ellis Haynes (1884-1962). Donated to the Society by Isabel Haynes of Bozeman, widow of Jack E. Haynes, the collection constitutes the most important pioneer photographic collection which still remained in private hands.

"Just receiving the collection is an honor and a tremendous responsibility," Cockhill remarked. It was the responsibility that put pressure on the Society's archival staff. In order to properly process and protect the collection, additional funds had to be garnered from outside legislative appropriated monies. After several months preparation, a grant was submitted and approved.

Under the two-year grant, photographic archivist Lory Morrow will clean the glass plate negatives, separate the chemically-unstable nitrate negatives, and make copy negatives of the entire collection.

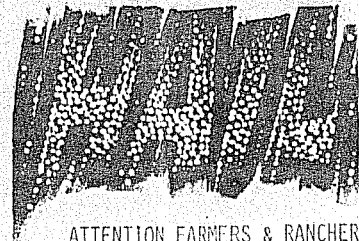
"It is essential that we make these copy negatives," Morrow explained, "for the glass plates are fragile and they should not be used to make prints again and again. The nitrate negatives are so unstable that they can deteriorate very rapidly."

Work on the project will begin in July and the Society archives hopes to have some portions of the collections ready for use by researchers and the public in the late fall. Included in the collection are the stunning photographs taken by F. Jay Haynes. As a young man Haynes learned the skills of photography in Moorhead, Minnesota, where he established a studio in the mid-1870's.

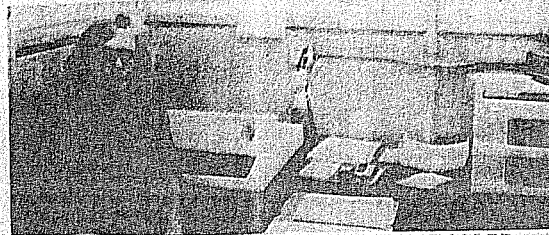
ARTISTS IN CONCERT

For a different flavor add a bit of lemon juice plus some grated rind to whipped cream, then freeze in dollops. Remove only as many as needed for topping.

POPLAR SHOPPER

WASPS & HORNETS AROUND THE HOME

Description: Yellow jackets, hornets, mud daubers, Polistes and cicada killers are all wasps that can be rather troublesome some during the summer months. Hornets, Polistes and mud daubers build their nests above ground, often in trees, shrubbery and under eaves. Yellow jackets usually build their nests below ground as does the cicada killer. Hornets and yellow jackets build football-shaped paper nests and Polistes build paper-like nests that resemble a honeycomb attached to the eaves. The paper nests of the hornets, yellow jackets and Polistes are abandoned in the fall of the year and these nests disintegrate during the winter or are torn apart by birds or squirrels.

ECONOMIC IMPORTANCE: Wasps and hornets are social insects that often take up habitation close to man. Some wasps build their nests of paper and others use mud. As a group, wasps are beneficial since they attack and destroy harmful insects around the home and in gardens. Wasps' presence close to man, however, is undesirable since these insects often tenaciously defend their nests and their sting can be medically dangerous to sensitive people as well as extremely painful. If wasps build their nests too close to your house or in bushes where children play, destroy the nests.

CONTROL: Commercially produced "wasp and hornet" aerosol sprays are quite effective and economical for ridding the house and yard of wasps. These aerosol sprays are designed to squirt a stream of insecticide 8-15 feet, allowing you to treat the nest from a distance. Treatment should be directed at the nest and applied at dusk, when wasps have returned to the nest and are quiet for the night. Direct a steady spray on the nest or into the opening for 5-10 seconds and then move away from the nest area. Check to see if there is wasp activity the next day; if not, knock down the nest and dispose of it.

ACT DATES ANNOUNCED

The 1979-80 school year is just beginning, but juniors and seniors at Poplar High School and other high schools across the country are already facing some big decisions. One of those decisions is what to do after graduation--whether to go on to school, to get a job, or try to do both. Making an important role in the students' postsecondary education and career planning will be guidance counselors, parents, friends, and a national service called the ACT Assessment Program. Designed to provide guidance in information for education and career planning, the widely used program is recommended for use by student applicants at more than 2700 colleges and universities. Poplar High School students will have five opportunities during the 1979-80 school year to make use of the national program, which consists of four tests and a two-part questionnaire. The basic student fee for using the ACT Assessment Program is \$7.50.

It takes students about three hours to complete the ACT Assessment's four exams covering subject areas of English, math, social studies, and natural sciences. On October 18, 1979 most local students will take the tests at the Poplar High School Library.

In addition to being used by students and their high school counselors, information provided by the ACT Assessments is also used by colleges for academic advising, admissions counseling, course selection and placement, student services, and institutional research. Students' ACT Assessment reports are sent to only those colleges specifically designated by the student.

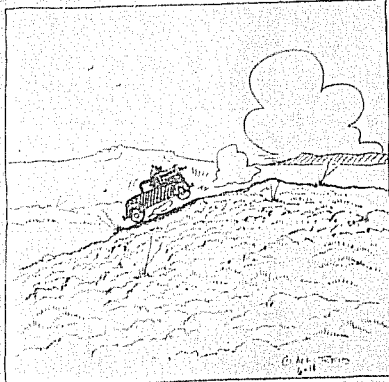

Dear Editor,

Recent letters appearing in the Shopper have showed the growing concern by the Poplar Community over incidents occurring with our children.

At the Monday night meeting of the Poplar school Board, a delegation of concerned parents presented a request to reorganize a Parent-Teacher-Student-Association (PTA). Here are the reasons we listed, creating a need for such an organization:

1. Lack of communication between parents and teachers, parents and administration, teachers and administration, parents, teachers and the school board. All causing mistrust, being misinformed, and inner structural feuding, creating an unhealthy atmosphere for the child in the school and influencing his ability to learn.

2. Discipline in the school. Formation of a disciplinary committee was step one. But we need for both parents of white and indian children on the committee now. And we need for representation of both school board and administration on the committee now. We would like to see a discipline policy set forth by all of these people, working together, within the next three months.

3. Drugs in the school. This is a problem to be dealt with by the disciplinary committee, now.

4. Lack of representation by the parents.

5. Lack of public or parental input on school issues and policies.

The Board approved our action, with some reservations and granted us the use of the Elementary Multipurpose Room, September 24, 1979 at 7:00pm.

I am writing this letter today in the hope that everyone in this community will lend their support to the formation of this P.T.A. It is my sincere belief that young and old alike are needed for their advice, experience, ideas, and more than anything else to show their concern over the problems facing our community.

The people have voiced a deep concern and now we need the people to follow through, with support for this organization.

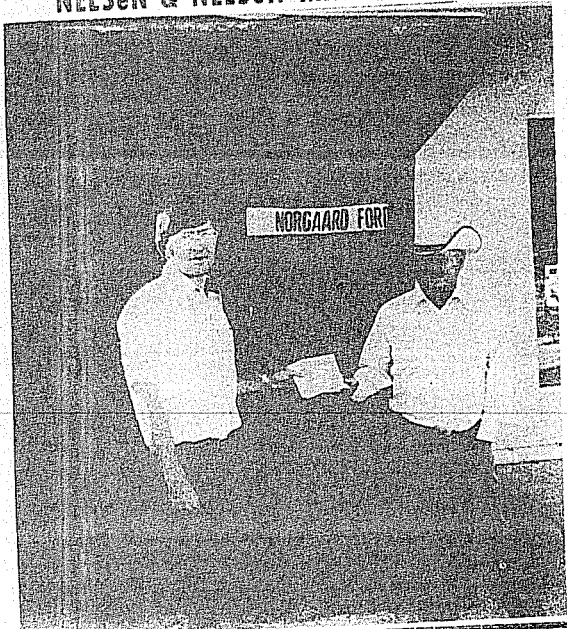

I consider it a privilege to have lived in the Poplar area most of my life. As a member of the Kim Hees' family, I feel I want to extend our thanks for the many kind deeds shown at the time of Kim's death, and to those who have so generously contributed to the Kim Hees Scholarship fund and the Kim Hees reward fund.

I have observed Kim's parents, Ted and Diane, her sister Pam, and Grandparents on both sides of the family, and knowing their anguish, our hearts go out to them. **BUT WE FEEL SO HELPLESS!**

I can remember Kim as a toddler, with such child-like faith. When their home was destroyed by fire in March 1970, Kim was so happy when a small portion of her toys and new doll were replaced. **NOW WE CANNOT HELP HER.** We can, however, each contribute in our own way, primarily by giving any information (however trivial it may seem to us) to our law enforcement officials. With your help this case can be solved sooner.

Kim died as she lived, with faith and trust in God, in her family, her friends and in this community. I feel the people who live in this area will have violated Kim's faith in us, as well as the trust of other families in this community who have experienced a similar tragedy, if we do not stand together, and act together NOW for the good of law and order, decency and respect in our town.

Surely we don't need another tragic murder to wake us up, two months have already gone by.

Brockton schools will be screening students for the purpose of discovering any school-age children with learning problems, speech and hearing impairments, or other handicapping conditions.

Parents will be contacted by school personnel if their children are among those referred for further testing and possible placement in a special program. Parents will be advised of the types of additional testing recommended, as well as their rights to review all records and tests used in their child's evaluation. Parental involvement is encouraged in developing these individualized programs, which meet the varying needs of their students.

These special programs are state funded programs designed to assist in meeting the various needs of the individual student. At Brockton we presently have the Title I Reading Program employing 2 Remedial Reading teachers, as well as a Speech Therapist on a cooperative basis with Poplar. We also have the services of a Psychologist library available, as well as consultive services, and materials through a cooperative lending library based in Scobey. Programs are developed for handicapped children by the classroom teachers and administration in cooperation with supportive services personnel. They will be provided in the local schools whenever possible.

It is assumed that all handicapped children in the Brockton school district are receiving help, however, if you know of any handicapped child or young adult who is not receiving education, please contact Ann Haagenstad, Elementary Principal at 786-3318 or write her at Brockton Elem. School, Brockton, MT.

The Metropolitan test will be used as a part of this screening. These tests are partially funded with a part of the 874 funds received by the Brockton school.

OPEN LETTER

LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

I am writing this letter to the parents of Poplar school children as well as the students themselves.

The behavior of many of the students & children has become intolerable, both in the gym and the area surrounding the school. Examples include students and children who, it appears, come to the games to run in and out of the gym and play in the foyer rather than watch the game; shooting spit wads at fans, cheerleaders, other students and opposing players; vandalizing cars in the parking lot; destroying school property as evidenced by the picture of the bleachers on the football field seen elsewhere in the week's Shopper; breaking windows, climbing up on the roofs of school buildings, fighting, littering, messing up the lavatories and other nuisances too numerous to mention. Many of these activities are very distracting to people who come to watch the ball games, besides being costly to the fans and the school.

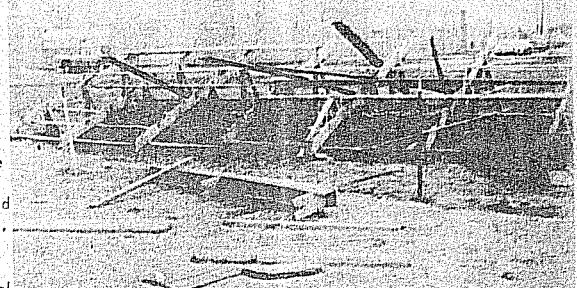
In an attempt to alleviate some of these problems, Poplar High School, is increasing the price of admission to \$1.25 for students and \$2.00 for adults. The increase will be used to pay a parking lot supervisor (if one can be hired). Staff members, assigned to monitor the foyer and doors, will be instructed to send outside any students or children who are causing a disturbance. The concession stand will be closed most of the playing time during the games in an attempt at eliminating one of the reasons students and children find it necessary to be in the foyer. All fans are also reminded they are not to watch the games from the doorways.

It is our hope that the fans will understand why these measures must be taken and will continue to patronize the Poplar High School activities.

GOVERNMENT GOULASH

The City of Wolf Point has proposed that a 2c per gallon tax be imposed on all gasoline sold at the retail level within Roosevelt County. Proceeds of this tax would be divided among the county and the cities based upon an established formula contained in legislation passed by the Montana Legislature.

I agree with the City of Wolf Point officials that our streets and roads are in need of maintenance and improvement. I am opposed to the imposition of a 2c per gallon tax on gasoline sold at the retail level. I feel that the revenue generated from this tax would not be adequate to address the maintenance and improvement projects that are needed on this county's streets and roads. If the people of this city want to improve their streets, Special Improvement Districts can be formed for these chipping and sealing projects or the paving projects. This ensures that each person's tax assessments go directly to improving the streets in front of their homes or businesses. A 2c per gallon gasoline tax can in no way be beneficial to each person who pays this additional tax.

Along with these ideas, I feel that the addition of 2c per gallon tax would put an additional burden on everyone who is already paying an excessive amount for their gasoline. This gasoline tax would be a regressive tax because it puts an excessive burden on those people who are in low income brackets, and who can least afford any additional costs for daily living expenses. I urge you not to sign any of the petitions that may be circulated on this issue in Poplar.

Numerous negative statements have been made about the Poplar School System in the past few years. Members of the Poplar Community may in error classify the entire school system as bad. This is not the case in my mind. The teachers of Poplar's schools are working extremely hard to help educate the children of this community. I wish to cite 2 teachers that have proposed two projects in an effort to improve our community and our children's educational experiences: Elaine Clark proposed a Career Day program at the Middle School on October 16, in an effort to get adults in the community to come to school to explain their jobs. Becky Fairley has proposed a program to help her students enter a Work-Study Program where they would work in local businesses for a few hours each day. Both projects are examples of positive programs that can be beneficial to this community. Support them by calling these teachers and discussing these programs with them. Efforts by the school system in this community can help to bridge the gap that has occurred between our school system and our community. I hope that these programs and other programs prove to be successful.

MONTANA PCB TESTING PROGRAM OPEN TO SMALL PRODUCERS

"The Montana Department of Agriculture and Livestock, in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, has developed a program to allow small hog and fowl producers who raise meat for home consumption to have thier herds and flocks tested for poly chorinated bithenyl (PCB) contamination. This program applies to only those producers who suspect they may have fed contaminated feed. For the duration of the present PCB problem, there is no charge to the producer for this service.

Small producers are those who raise hogs or fowl for home use. To have their animals tested producers may contact their local County Extension office for sampling instructions. Animals sampled for PCB contamination will be sacrificed, but the carcasses may be frozen by the owner until test results are available. The samples will be sent to laboratories approved by USDA for PCB testing. The cost of the testing will be borne by USDA. Test results will be available from County Agents.

Under two certification programs announced earlier, producers who never had a problem with contaminated feed may obtain certification of their animal by providing documentation to the Montana Department of Livestock. Producers who feel they may have a problem with contaminated animals may arrange to have a representative sample of their animals slaughtered at any federally inspected slaughter house. If the sample is found to be PCB free, all animals represented by that sample will be certified as PSB free.

For Further information on the new sampling program for small producers may be obtained from any County Extension office. Information on two earlier certification programs for larger producers may be obtained from the Montana Department of Livestock.

The Poplar City Commission is in the process of selecting 5 people to be on the Board of Directors of the Poplar Housing Authority. The Housing Authority was created after a majority of the voters in the May election approved it's creation. Once the Directors are chosen, meetings will be held to decide what course of action should be taken to alleviate the housing problems in this city.

The Poplar Housing Authority will administer the Gateway Housing Project after the completion of the renovation process. The City Commission will encourage the Board of Directors to take an active interest in the oversight of the renovation of this building. This will enable the Board of Directors to gain a better understanding of the project, and the figures connected with it.

The City Commission and Richard Shope of Helena will be analyzing the bids that were received last night for the renovation of the old Gateway Hotel. Each bid will be carefully reviewed to see that it complies with all the specifications that were noted in the project plans.

There were bids from several local and area contractors. The architect for the project, Richard Shope, is confident that the project can be completed in 100 days. The apartment building will have 14 units of which 5 will be 3 bedroom units, 5 will be 2 bedroom units, and 4 will be 1 bedroom units. Each apartment will be individually metered for both gas and electricity. Occupancy could occur as early as June 1, 1980.

The next City Commission meeting is on November 14. The public is invited to attend these meetings and take an active part in the affairs of this government. Copies of the 1979-1980 City of Poplar budget can be looked at during working hours at the City Hall. Any questions on the budget, or any city policy will gladly be answered.

ASCS FARM NEWS

Roosevelt County farmers placed over 187,026 bushels of their 1979 grain crops under price support loans as of 10-25-79, according to Roger Lee, Chairperson of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee. ASCS loaned over \$418,217 to farmers on 1980 bushels of wheat. Commodity loans are available to producers who participate in ASCS farm programs. "The money enables farmers to pay operating and production costs while they look for a better market. Lee said, "and it allows them time to develop marketing options and sell when the price is right. In most cases producers satisfy their loan obligations by repaying the money before the loan matures or by forfeiting the crop to the commodity credit Corporation if pre-

TO WORKSHOP

On November 1 and 2, Michael Youngman will be attending the annual Refresher Training Workshop at the VA Medical and Regional Office Center at Fort Harrison. The purpose of this workshop is to provide training so that those who attend will be better able to serve the veterans and dependents in the community.

TAX RELIEF

Roosevelt County Assessor, Walter K. Greufe, reports the Dept. of Revenue is mailing the pre-addressed 1979 Property Tax Relief application to individuals who received relief last year. This year's relief is part of a comprehensive income and property tax relief package enacted by the 1979 legislature. Because you need to know your taxes before you can complete the relief application; the application forms will be mailed a few days after your county releases its tax bills. For example counties who have already released tax bills including Roosevelt, Daniel and Valley have been mailed applications as of Oct. 26. Each homeowner who lives in, and is assessed for a home and has not rented it for over 2 months is eligible to receive relief. The amount of relief granted will be either the total amount of property tax due on the property or \$65 whichever is the lesser. The taxpayer will have to complete the form by filling in their name, mailing address, social security number, and total tax due on the property; sign it; and mail the completed form to their local county assessor. The assessor will approve the form and forward it to the Dept. of Revenue in Helena for processing. The department will then forward a check for the relief amount to the applicant at the address indicated on the application. Blank applications will be available from local assessors for those who do not receive one in the reasonable time, or did not apply last year. Greufe stressed the filing deadline for this year is December 14, 1979 at 5:p.m.

To the people of the Poplar Community:

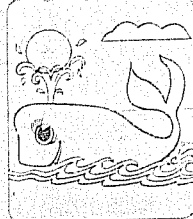

I'd like to share some of my feelings with you about my best friend, Kim Nees. Somehow, I feel a little better when I talk about her. It helps to heal the hurt I feel inside. I've got really good memories of Kim and then there are the bad memories, of how she died. When her crime is solved the bad ones will go away. That's what I'm told.

Kim attended Mineral Bench School until the 4th grade when she moved to town. We were in Mr. Laager's class together.

We became very close friends about a year ago. She wasn't like a sister-- she was closer than a sister. I don't even know how to describe our friendship. I knew her about as good as I know myself. We could just look at each other and know what one another was thinking. It was incredible--sometimes we'd look at one another and laugh at the same time. She was the closest friend I ever had.

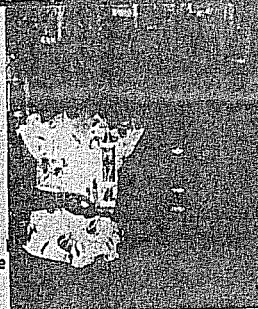
We went out every week night. At first she'd tell me when she planned to call my house. Then she just called at the same time each day. The phone would ring and I knew it was Kim. After she died, the phone rang several times, "at her time". It was a hard adjustment to realize it wasn't Kim -- it would never be Kim again. That's the part that really bothers me--she was with me one day and gone the next, for the rest of my life. We'd made so many plans--and were to be roommates at college.

Kim was her dad's "hired man" at the farm. She liked to be out in the country and drive the tractor. She loved the food her Gramma cooked there too.

She was so peppy and full of life. I remember ten days before she died a bunch of us kids went water skiing. It was early June and the water was freezing, but Kim was the first to jump in. She really looked forward to summer.

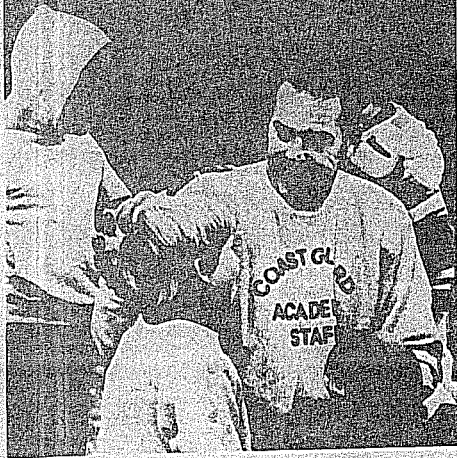
CONCERT TOUR

If you are in the market for new bed pillows perhaps BONUS can help you make the right selection and give you some insight into proper care.

Pillows are available in a wide range of fillings so you should consider what type of pillow is best for you. A pillow that will give you many years of comfortable sleep might keep someone else tossing and turning. Ideally, everyone should select his or her own pillow, but if you are buying pillows for your family, check with them to find out their preference. Ask what size pillow they prefer and do they like it soft, medium or firm.

Before you buy a pillow test it. Pick it up and feel it with your hands. Check the label to see what filling it contains and whether it is soft, medium or firm.

The softest and most luxurious pillows are filled with down. Down is the soft, shaftless fluff from the breasts of geese and ducks. This is by far the most expensive filling. These pillows are soft, light and resilient. Most of the down pillows made today are washable and are treated to be dust-free, odorless and mildew resistant.

For people who prefer their pillows firmer, select a pillow filled with a blend of down and feathers. The more feathers in the blend, the firmer the pillow. Feathers cause a pillow to be heavier, less resilient and less soft than down-filled pillows because of the quill shaft. Waterfowl feathers are finer, softer and lighter in weight and less stiff than turkey and chicken feathers. Turkey and chicken feathers are inferior because they must be artificially curled and can lose their resiliency and flatten out. Artificially curled feathers are often labeled "crushed feathers." When selecting a pillow of down and feathers, the greater the percentage of feathers to down, the greater the firmness.

All-feather pillows are the firmest of the natural fills. They are less expensive than all-down or blended feather-and-down pillows, and will also provide years of comfortable sleep.

Like down pillows, most feather-and-down pillows can be machine washed and dried, are treated to be free of dust and are odorless and mildew resistant.

Any of the down, feather-and-down or feather pillows will usually outlast synthetic pillows. They are considered a good investment.

Pillows can also be filled with polyester or foam. The polyester fiberfills are buoyant, easily washed, hypoallergenic, odorless, mothproof and mildewproof. One-piece roll batting is best because clumps of filling would lump in use and washing.


One of the newest fillings is a blend of polyester, white goose down and white goose feathers. This offers the best features of both types of fill.

Latex-foam pillows have many of the same qualities as the polyester fiberfill. Check the care label for the proper washing and drying instructions and follow them carefully.

Pillow coverings should be closely woven and have welted or piped seams to give a strong, durable pillow that keeps the filling in place. Removable, zippered covers are also available for further protection.

Fluff pillows daily and push the corners toward the center so that the crown stays high. This will keep them plump. One tip that will keep your feather-and-down pillows fresh is to put them into the dryer occasionally on low heat for 10 minutes. This will take out the humidity and dust, and keep the pillows resilient.

MARIJUANA: What is it?

PART 1

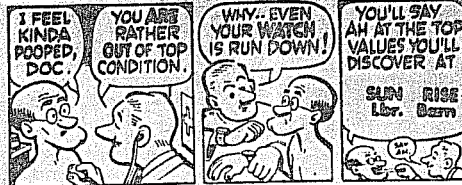
There is a growing drug problem right here on the Fort Peck Indian Reservation. It has been estimated that as many as 80% of the students in the four high schools on the reservation at least have tried marijuana, and many are habitual users. What is more alarming is the fact that children as young as seven and eight years old are using grass (marijuana). Marijuana refers to any part of the hemp plant, *Cannabis sativa*. It is usually smoked, but can be drank in a tea or eaten. Grass or pot varies in strength depending on where and how it is grown, prepared and stored.

Marijuana is a complex mixture of more than a dozen cannabinoids, 30 terpenes, sterols and other chemicals. Delta 9-tetrahydrocannabinol sometimes called THC, is the main psychoactive ingredient the chemical that acts on the brain causing mood changes and changes in perception. Typical marijuana in the US has 1-2% THC, but hashish, another stronger form of the drug, has 10% THC. Other substances in the marijuana may change its action or have their own effect on the body.

Street marijuana may have varying potency and may contain other chemicals: catnip and Oregon have been substituted for cannabis (they are not psychoactive and should have little or no effect on the user); some Mexican marijuana has been sprayed with paraquat, a dangerous pesticide. In some instances, other potent drugs such as amphetamines (speed) or opium (a narcotic) may be added to marijuana. Another drug phencyclidine, often called Angel Dust, which can cause unpredictable and serious reactions, is sometimes sprayed on parsley or mint and sold as THC or super pot.

How does marijuana compare to other psychoactive drugs? "As we learn how they work, drug categories are becoming more distinct," says Dr. Jeffrey Barker, a neuroscientist conducting research on the mechanism of action of psychoactive drugs at the National Institute of Neurological and Communicative Disorders and Stroke, Bethesda, Maryland. "We know they have clear pharmacological effects on the nervous system, are distracting from life, and are physically addictive. Tetrahydrocannabinol is a drug whose effects appear to be more subtle. Research has shown however, that detectable blood levels remain for 12 to 14 hours after a single dose. If taken daily, it can build up a level that stays in the body for a long period of time. We don't know what the long-term affects are, but it appears to be something that distracts you from life, and can cause a loss of goals, purposelessness. Next week part II

...to the area. We were told by a Tribal Policeman to leave the area. My husband told him, "That's my pickup, and I have a daughter missing. I want to know what in the hell is going on." We were told to leave because no one was allowed to be in the area. We proceeded to the next road block where my husband informed the officer that if we could not find out what was going on he would "run over" someone to find out. We finally were able to get the sheriff to tell us the horrible details. When we arrived home we found out that the news of our daughter's murder was "common knowledge" at the local cafe. This is just one more example of how unprofessional the law enforcement agencies of the area are. We were not even given the courtesy of being notified of our daughter's death before the local "coffee crowd" was informed.

We are still and always will be without our daughter. Even though we know that there are several individuals that know the details. This hideous crime is unintentional, as are others in this area. How many tragedies does it take before the Tribal, City, County, State and Federal Authorities will realize that there might be a problem here?

I was born in Poplar, attended school and graduated there. I always thought Poplar was No. 1. But when a community can let something like this happen to my child, or anyone else's and calmly treat it as just another unfortunate incident, I can no longer be a part of that community. My husband and I have relocated, and we leave many dear friends behind. We miss them and wish them well. But for God's sake, don't let this happen to your child, because you still have a murderer walking your streets.

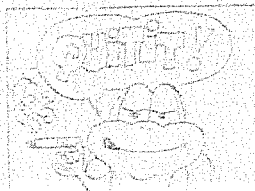

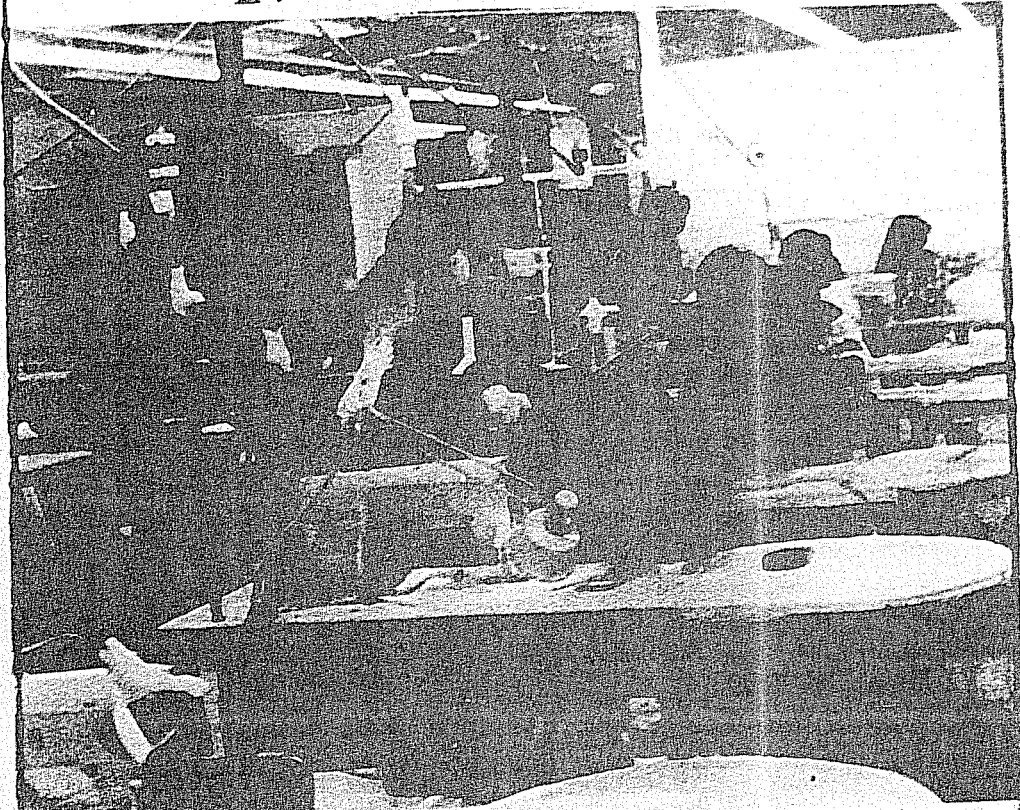


